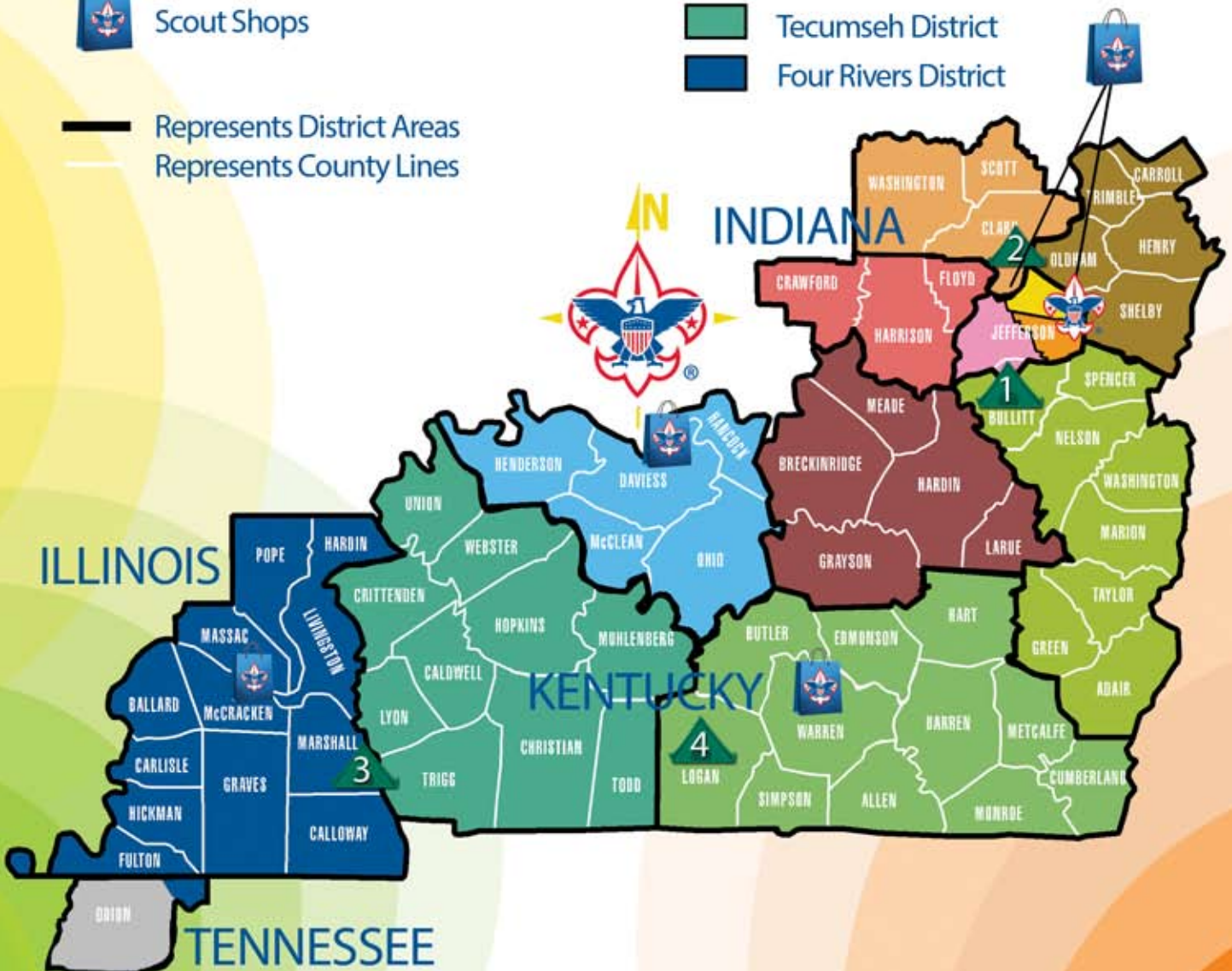

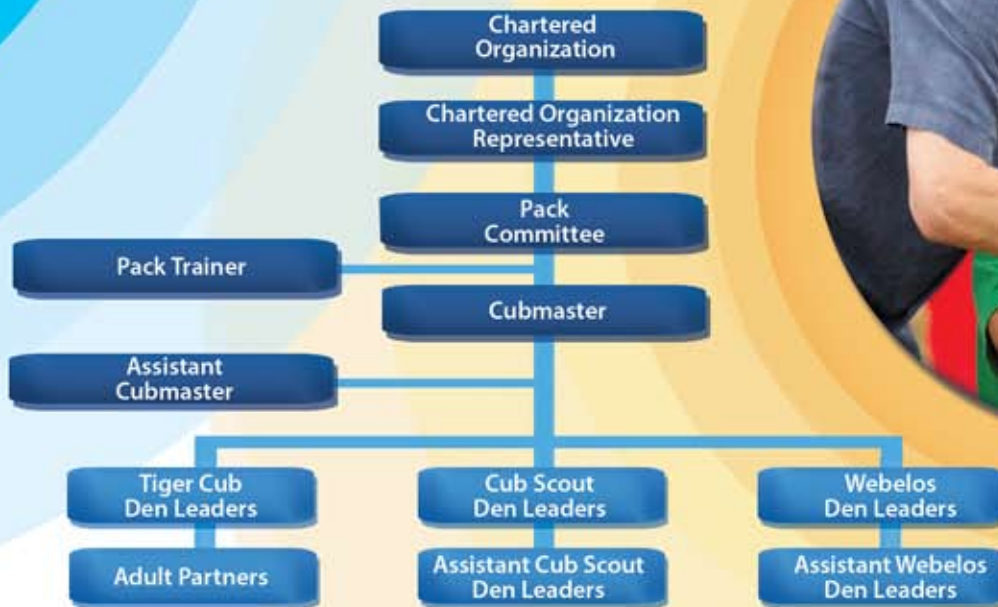

Pack Volunteer Leadership

Committee Chair

Conducts monthly pack leaders' meeting to help plan program. Ensures that adequate support to run program is given to Cubmaster and den leaders by committee members. Helps recruit additional leaders as needed. Fast Start Training and Basic Leader Training are offered for this position to help new leaders succeed.

Committee Members

Attend monthly pack leaders' meeting to help plan program and take care of records, finances, advancement, activities and membership. Fast Start Training and Basic Leader Training are offered for this position to help new leaders succeed.

Cubmaster

Conducts monthly pack meeting. Aids den leaders by coordinating monthly program for all leaders. Attends monthly pack leaders' meeting. Fast Start Training and Basic Leader Training are offered for this position to help new leaders succeed.

Tiger Cub Den Leader

Coordinates shared leadership among the Tiger Cub adult partners. This ensures den meetings and outings are planned, prepared for and conducted by all adult partners on a rotating basis. Den activities provide advancement opportunities for the boys in the den. Serves as den host for family members at pack meetings. Attends monthly pack leader's meeting and monthly roundtable meetings. Fast Start and Basic Leader Training are offered for this position to help the new leader succeed.

Cub Scout Den Leader

Meets weekly for about an hour with a den of six to eight boys. Den meeting is held in den leader's home, a church or other suitable place. The den leader determines time, day and location of den

meeting that is most convenient for him or her. Attends monthly pack leaders' meeting. Both Fast Start and Basic Leader Training projects are offered for this position to help new leaders succeed.

Webelos Den Leader

Same as Cub Scout den leader except works with older Webelos Scouts. Encourages periodic parent/son overnight campouts. Attends monthly pack leaders' meeting. Fast Start and Basic Leader Training are offered for this position to help new leaders succeed.

Pack Trainer

Conducts orientation for new families and pack leaders. Trains new leaders for their specific leadership positions or encourages participation in district training. Encourages pack leaders to attend. Conducts other training as designated. Keeps track of pack training records. Pack trainers should be trained in a District or Council Trainer Development Conference. They should, of course, have completed a training session before they teach it.

ScoutParent Coordinator

Assist pack and/or den with specific projects as needed by the leaders. All parents help their sons with advancement. The role of the ScoutParent Coordinator is to encourage and recruit parents to get involved in the Pack.

What is a ScoutParent?

A ScoutParent is a parent or adult mentor of a Scout who enthusiastically participates with their Scout and also helps other volunteers to provide the best quality program experience to all youth in every unit.

The Den

The Cub Scout pack is divided by age groups into several smaller groups called dens.

- Tiger Cubs (first grade, or 7 years old)
- Wolf Cubs (second grade, or 8 years old)
- Bear Cubs (third grade, or 9 years old)
- Webelos Scouts (fourth and fifth grades, or 10 years old)

Most packs have a den for each grade level while some have more than one - two Wolf dens for example. Smaller packs may contain fourth and fifth-graders into a single Webelos Scout den while larger packs might have separate first and second-year Webelos Scout dens.

Dens typically consist of six to eight boys. The size and structure lets boys build relationships with each other and with leaders. It gives boys leadership opportunities and the chance to do activities that would be difficult with a larger group.

Dens meet several times a month in between pack meetings. Activities vary based on age.

Tiger Cubs do family activities with their adult partners, who may be parents or other adults. Tiger Cub age boys join Cub Scouting together with their adult partners, and they do Cub Scouting activities together too. The Tiger Cub den leader gives leadership to the Tiger Cub den with the assistance of the adult partners. Den meeting activities include working on the activities necessary to achieve the Tiger Cub rank, games, skits, etc. At the end of the school year, usually in May or June, Tiger Cubs graduate and become part of a Wolf Cub Scout den.

Wolf Cubs and **Bear Cubs** attend den meetings that are planned and run by an adult den leader with the help of an assistant den leader and often a den chief (a Boy Scout). Work on advancement happens in the den meetings, along with games, skits, and other activities. When Bear Cub Scouts have completed the third grade, they may become Webelos Scouts.

Webelos Scouts have a different program from their younger counterparts. At each of their den meetings, they work on activity badges in one of 20 different interest areas. Den meetings also include games, sports, stunts, and preparation for the den's part in the pack meeting. One of the purposes of the Webelos program is to prepare boys for Boy Scouting and to help them graduate into a Boy Scout troop, so Webelos Scouts have opportunities for overnight campouts and joint activities with Boy Scout troops.



Questions You May Have:

How much time will this take?

Most Scouting groups meet once a week. Some weekly meetings are replaced with outings or activities. Scouting is a year round program, where weekly meetings follow the school year and the summer is filled with outdoor and camping opportunities.

Who are the leaders?

The leaders are parents just like you and community minded individuals who volunteer their time for the benefit of young people. All adult volunteers must fill out an adult application, go through a background check, and take Youth Protection training.

How much does it cost?

The annual registration fee is \$24 for 12 months and Boys Life Magazine is \$12 for 12 months. Dens and Packs can participate in fundraisers throughout the year to support additional activities. Every Pack is different and may have additional annual dues.

How can I become an adult volunteer in Cub Scouting?

There are many roles to be filled in each Pack, and every parent willing to help is always appreciated. Ask your Pack leaders about where they could use a hand.

What do you do in Cub Scouting?

Your son will have opportunities to participate and learn new skills while earning awards and recognitions both at meetings (with boys his age) and at home. Activities which you can choose include camping, swimming, archery, BB Range, sports, derby car races, games, and hands on projects, summer day camps, and weekend campouts.



The Advancement Plan

The responsibility of a boy's advancement in Cub Scouting lies with the family and not with the pack. Some advancement requirements are done at den meetings, but most are done at home with the family.

Bobcat

All boys in 1st thru 5th grade earn the Bobcat badge first by learning the Cub Scout Promise, Law of the Pack, handshake, salute, sign, motto and meaning of "Webelos." After receiving the Bobcat badge, each boy works on requirements based on his grade level.



Webelos

When a Cub Scout has completed the third grade (or becomes 10 years old), he transfers to a Webelos den led by an adult Webelos leader. The boy works on requirements for the Webelos badge, 20 activity badges and the Arrow of Lights Award (the highest award in Cub Scouting).



Tiger Cub

The Tiger Cub program is for first grade (or age 7) boys and their adult partners. There are five Tiger Cub achievement areas. The Tiger Cub, working with his adult partner, completes 15 requirements within these areas to earn the Tiger Cub Badge. These requirements consist of an exciting series of indoor and outdoor activities just right for a boy in the first grade.



Arrow Points

For every 10 electives a boy completes, he earns an Arrow Point. A boy may earn as many Arrow Points as he can.



Wolf

A Cub Scout who has completed first grade (or is age 8) works on 12 achievements to earn the Wolf badge.

After he earns his Wolf badge, a boy may work on electives in different interest areas until he is old enough to begin work on the Bear rank.



Bear

A Cub Scout who has completed second grade (or is age 9) works to complete 12 of 24 achievements to earn the Bear badge.

After he earns his Bear badge, a boy may work on electives in different interest areas until he is old enough to begin work on the Webelos rank.



As with the Wolf badge, for every 10 electives a boy completes, he earns an Arrow Point.

A boy may earn as many Arrow Points as he can.



Cub Scout Fun & Activities

Pinewood Derby

A parent/son project in which you build a race car made from a block of wood. Car must weigh 5 ounces or less and must clear the track. Be there the night of the big race!

Blue and Gold Banquet

Scouting's birthday party for Cub Scouting, usually held during February.

Scouting for Food

Food drive held to benefit local food banks. Part of our program is to help the hungry.

Outings and Field Trips

"Outing" is a big part of Scouting. Cub Scouts get out and about with many kinds of outdoor fun, such as field trips, hikes, nature and conservation.

Pack Camping Trips

Learn to live in the outdoors. Staying in a tent overnight with your family is a big adventure for any Cub Scout. From sitting around a campfire to learning about the natural world, your Cub Scout will create memories that last a lifetime while spending quality time with his family.

Great Scouting Experiences begin with Volunteer Training!



Training courses are designed to help our members improve leadership skills and deliver a quality program.

Your time is valuable, so we offer many training opportunities and methods. The step-by-step tutorial you need to create an account and to complete online training can be found at myscouting.org.

What Makes a Trained Cub Scout Leader?

Youth Protection Training

First, complete Youth Protection. This training is REQUIRED BEFORE submitting an adult application and every 2 years afterwards. This training gives you the insight and knowledge necessary to help promote a safe environment for our Youth and Adults in Scouting. Unit leaders are now able to Update their adult member's YPT online. Visit myscouting.org for additional information.

Fast Start Orientation Training

Orientation courses are designed to help adult leaders learn more about their Scouting role and about other leadership positions in the program. Fast Start Training is intended to be taken by Cub Scout leaders immediately following the acceptance of their new role. This is completed online at myscouting.org. (45 minutes)

Leader Specific Training

Finally, you are ready for Leader Specific Training. This training gives you the nuts and bolts for your specific position in Scouting.



SCOUTING BARRIERS TO ABUSE

1. Two-deep leadership.
2. One-on-one contact between adults and Scouts is prohibited.
3. Separate accommodations for adults and Scouts are required.
4. Privacy of youth is respected.
5. Inappropriate use of cameras, imaging, and digital devices is prohibited.
6. No secret organizations.
7. No hazing.
8. No bullying.
9. Youth leadership is monitored by adult leaders.
10. Discipline must be constructive.
11. Appropriate attire for all activities.
12. Members are responsible to act according to the Scout Oath and Scout Law.
13. Units are responsible to enforce Youth Protection policies.

YOUTH PROTECTION TRAINING

The Boy Scouts of America places the greatest importance on creating the most secure environment possible for our youth members. To maintain such an environment, the BSA developed numerous procedural and leadership selection policies and provides parents and leaders with resources for the Cub Scout, Boy Scout, and Venturing programs.

You do not have to be a registered member or have a member ID to take Youth Protection training.

To take Youth Protection training, go to MyScouting.org and create an account.

From the MyScouting.org portal, click on E-Learning and take the Youth Protection training.

Upon completion, you may print a certificate of completion to submit with a volunteer application or submit the completion certificate to the unit leader for processing at the local council.

When your volunteer application is approved, you will receive a BSA membership card which includes your member ID number. After you receive your membership card, log back into [MyScouting](http://MyScouting.org), click on My Profile and update the system by inputting your member ID number. This will link your Youth Protection training records, and any other training, in [MyScouting](http://MyScouting.org) to your BSA.
